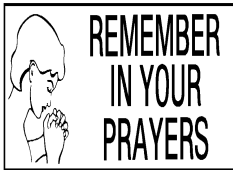

Healing Mass

Anointing the Sick

Please remember anyone who is in need of the Anointing of the Sick should not hesitate to contact the Rectory. It is recommended that you come in for this sacrament prior to hospital admission. The hospital chaplain may not always be able to anoint you prior to surgery. This sacrament is meant to strengthen the members of the church and to find the deeper meaning in the sufferings and pain that comes to all in this life. "The most beautiful moment in a priest's life is in the administering of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick."

Choose Life

On Italy's Day of Life, Pope Benedict XVI urged more than 50,000 people gathered for a special address to oppose both abortion and euthanasia, pointing out that human life is "a great a mysterious gift."

"Life, which is the work of God, must not be denied to any one, not even the smallest and defenseless newborn, and much less so when he has serious handicaps.... I urge you not to fall into the deception of thinking that one can dispose of life to the point of legitimizing its interruption with euthanasia, masking it perhaps with a veil of human mercy," Pope Benedict said.

Risk is a part of life, an action we can choose to take.☺ Those now living and growing in their mother's womb inhabit a place that has become more dangerous than any battlefield of terrorist target. Their lives hang in the balance every moment. They did not choose their risk; someone else chose it for them. Are we willing to risk defending unborn children? Memory Lane

As it appeared in St. Jerome's bulletin, June 20, 1956:

Cornerstone of New Church to be laid Today

The culmination of a dream of some 30-odd years by the older parishioners in our midst and the driving ambition for the past 15 years of the newer addition to our flock, will be realized today when the cornerstone of our beautiful new church will be laid.

The imposing ceremony will take place today at the completion of the last Mass at 1:30 p.m. Our beloved Pastor, the Very Rev. Msgr. James E. Cowhig, has been designated by Archbishop O'Boyle to perform the rite as a fitting tribute to the untiring efforts he has put forth in bringing us to this high point and final project in our building activities.

With the strong steel beams rising in the sky already giving promise of the commanding structure which will be a landmark in this bustling suburb of the Nation's Capital and the main floor already laid, we have not long to wait before we may worship God in a setting conducive to perfect meditation and communion with our Creator.

Soon to be forgotten will be the inconveniences of staggered hours of Masses to eliminate as much as possible traffic tie ups, the uncomfortable kneeling positions in the school auditorium with the altar on the stage, and the cramped quarters of our basement church, which we so quickly outgrew....

Little did our predecessors realize in 1925 when the basement church was built; and the altars, pews and other usable equipment were moved from the original little brick church; that we would comply with the wishes and policies of our then Archbishop of Baltimore, the Most Rev. Michael J. Curley, and build a school first so that our children could be taught of God along with their three R's before we turned our thoughts to completing the church atop the basement structure as was planned in 1925.

Bringing the good Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur to teach our children meant that they needed a shelter other than the temporary quarters they occupied, and accordingly the immediate need after the school was completed was the building of a convent....

Representatives from all of the parish organizations will also witness the ceremonies. These include the Holy Name Society, the Junior Holy Name, the Ladies of the Sodality of Our Lady, the Junior Sodality, the Prosise Club, the Adult Choir, the Ladies of Charity and St. Vincent de Paul Society, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, The Children of Mary and the Knights of St. Joseph. It is hoped that each family in the parish will be represented by at least one member....

The following document will be placed in the cornerstone together with those found in the cornerstone laid in 1886:

"The cornerstone of St. Jerome's new church at Hyattsville, Prince Georges County, Maryland, was laid on Sunday, June 10, 1956 during the Pontificate of Pope Pius XII by the pastor, The Very Rev. Msgr James e. Cowhig, assisted by Rev. Charles W. Davis and Rev. John O. Winnenberg, Assistant Pastors of the Parish. Also present ere The Very Rev. Richard Birdsall, Superior of the Divine Savior Seminary, Lanham, MD and representatives from the Holy Cross College, Brookland, DC The church will continue to be a memorial to the Most Rev. John Carroll; DD, 1st Archbishop of Baltimore, as it was originally designated on October 31, 1886, when the parish was founded. Pope Pius XII, First Archbishop of Washington serving the 8th year of his office – The Most Rev. Patrick A. O'Boyle; President of the United States, Dwight D. Eisenhower; Governor of MD, Theodore R. McKeldin, Architects, Walton and Madden, Contractor, Fred Lippert."
