Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

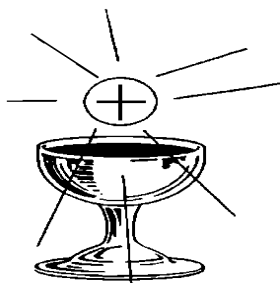
Each year, the national Collection for the Church in Latin America is held in parishes across the country. **In the Archdiocese of Washington, this special collection will be held on the weekend of July 21-22, 2007.** Proceeds from the collection are distributed to dioceses, parishes, religious congregations, seminaries and other Catholic institutions throughout Latin America and the Caribbean to assist in the formation of priests, religious, lay ministers, missionaries, pastoral workers, catechists and youth ministers. Thus, fellow Catholics in Latin America and the Caribbean—who are rich in faith but lacking in material resources—are not only able to participate more fully in the life of the Church, but are enabled to share it with others as well.

The funds are used by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on the Church in Latin America to support pastoral grants program in 22 countries as well as the work of the Department of Social Development and World Peace on behalf of the Church in Latin America. Anointing the Sick

Please remember anyone who is in need of the Anointing of the Sick should not hesitate to contact the Rectory. It is recommended that you come in for this sacrament prior to hospital admission. The hospital chaplain may not always be able to anoint you prior to surgery. This sacrament is meant to strengthen the members of the church and to find the deeper meaning in the sufferings and pain that comes to all in this life. "The most beautiful moment in a priest's life is in the administering of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick."

Child Protection in the Archdiocese of Washington

Child protection is a priority of the Archdiocese of Washington, which has the most comprehensive child protection policies in the nation. This policy calls for prevention, quick response, and pastoral care. **All employees and volunteers who have substantial contact with children must attend child protection workshops and undergo a criminal background check, and those who suspect child abuse must report it to the authorities.** The policy (in English and Spanish), workshop schedules and reporting, fingerprinting and other information are available online at www.adw.org. (click on "Protecting Our Children"), and from your parish office and parish school principal. Anyone who has experienced harm from a person working or volunteering for a Church entity is encouraged to report this to the authorities and to contact the Archdiocesan Director of Child Protection Services, Ms. Marcia Zvara, 301-853-5328, so we may provide assistance.

Appropriate Dress in Church

"The summer months bring a welcome slowing-down to the overly hectic pace of modern life. School is out. People go on vacation. The warm weather promotes outdoor activities and socializing. The collar gets loosened a little and this, it seems to me, is all for the good. Unfortunately, this more relaxed atmosphere can sometimes lead to excesses. Liturgical ministers may not show up for their assignments. Those who do show up – including the clergy – may not have prepared themselves to exercise their role as thoroughly as the liturgy demands. And then there is the issue of dress. I think everyone would agree that not all summer wear is appropriate for the liturgy. Knowing where to draw the line, however, and how to draw the line takes some skill and tact. Fortunately, the pastor, who usually gets saddled with having to decide both the where and the how, can usually count on the support of his people when he exercises this most important role. Most congregations still have a pretty well-defined sense of decorum – what is appropriate for church and what is not appropriate. Occasional reminders of the rules of decorum are a service to everyone – to the vast majority who understand the rules and observe them, and to the small minority who, from time to time, need to be corrected."-ADW Office of Worship
